## 6 Reminders for the General Election

Ahead of the 2024 General Election on November 5, we have a few key reminders for Hawaii voters.

- 1. Hawaii is a vote-by-mail state. Your General Election ballot will arrive by mail. Registered Hawaii voters automatically receive a mail ballot for every election.
- 2.Check that your voter registration is current. Visit elections.hawaii.gov or call (808) 453-VOTE (8683) to verify that your voter registration is accurate. If you have moved or changed your mailing address since the Primary Election, you must update your voter registration to ensure that your mail ballot is sent to your current address. Conveniently update online or by submitting

- a Voter Registration Application. Voter Registration Applications are also available at post offices or libraries.
- 3. Sign up for ballot notifications. Be able to track when your ballot has been mailed and when your voted ballot has been received through ballot notifications. Sign up to receive alerts by text, email, or a phone message at elections.hawaii. gov.
- 4. Sign your ballot return envelope. You can expect to receive your ballot packet by October 18 for the General Election. Before your ballot arrives, review statements from the candidates at elections. hawaii.gov. You must sign the return envelope for your ballot to be counted.
- 5. Your ballot must be received by 7:00 pm on November 5. Voted ballots can be returned by mail or dropped off at a ballot drop box. Visit elections.hawaii.gov for location details. Ballots received after the deadline cannot be counted.
- of assistance is available. In need of assistance? Consider the following accessible options: 1) Visit a voter service center to vote using accessible voting equipment, or 2) Request an electronic ballot and mark your ballot using your personal compatible device. ## Steam is adding screen reader support and other accessibility tools

The screen reader is SteamOS only; most other features are also coming to Big Picture Mode.

Adi Robertson is a senior tech and policy editor focused on VR, online platforms, and free expression. Adi has covered video games, biohacking, and more for The Verge since 2011.

Valve is introducing accessibility features for players with disabilities in its latest beta for Steam Big Picture Mode and SteamOS. The features — listed in full and explained here — include options to modify the Steam UI, like a high contrast mode, as well as a built-in screen reader for SteamOS.

In its post, Valve describes the features as "just the first accessibility features we're making available." For now players on both Big Picture Mode and SteamOS will get:

- 1. A scaling slider for text size
- 2. High-contrast mode to make buttons and text more visible
- 3.A "reduce motion" toggle that disables some animation and screen transition effects

SteamOS devices (at this point, the Steam Deck and Lenovo Legion Go S) can also find:

- A screen reader with adjustable pitch, volume, and reading rate, enabled and disabled either through settings or with a twobutton shortcut
- 2.A color filter that affects both the Steam UI and any games you're playing you can choose between grayscale, inverted display brightness, or inverted display colors

The features are available on a new Accessibility tab in the settings, seen below for SteamOS.

Earlier this month Valve also started letting Steam users filter games by accessibility support including some options similar to the ones above, as well as adjustable difficulty and speechto-text or text-to-speech chat. It's encouraging players with disabilities to suggest more features in a discussion thread (a mono audio toggle is looking popular.) And for anyone who doesn't need these features, while I haven't been able to try the beta yet, it sounds like might all be getting a bare-bones universal Kurosawa mode.

Using the telephone access method: You can use the toll-free number 1-888-882-1629, then press 5 at the Newsline Main Menu for "Newspapers in a Different State". Then press 5 again for "National Meetings of Interest to the Print-Disabled". From there, you can press 1 for the ACB 2025 Convention Agenda.

You will find the virtual convention event schedule in the Calendar section by pressing 11.

If you want to email any of the articles to your inbox, simply press Pound 9 and follow the prompts.

To read the agenda online using WEB NEWS ON DEMAND, visit www.nfbnewslineonline. org. After logging in with your identification number and security code, you select "PUBLICATIONS ORGANIZED BY STATE", and then select the category "NATIONAL MEETINGS"

OF INTEREST TO THE PRINT-DISABLED" and select the ACB 2025 Convention Agenda.

To read the agenda using NEWSLINE Mobile for iOS, open the Newsline app and navigate to the second page which is the "INFORMATION SOURCES"

page. From there, select ALL PUBLICATIONS, and search ACB 2025 Convention Agenda or scroll down to find it in the list of publications. You can download the app from the App Store as NFB-Newsline Mobile.
